The grandfather of the Wellington family. Refined. Nuanced. (1885)




HOT POCKET

Thomas H. Kennedy, age 87, loving husband, father and grandfather, passed away on December 4, 2024 surrounded by his family. The son of the late Walter and Ada (Harris) Kennedy, he was born on July 6, 1937 in Bay City. Tom earned his Bachelors Degree in Secondary Education and a Masters Degree in Guidance and Counseling from Western Michigan University. He truly enjoyed his time at Western and was a proud "Bronco" the rest of his life. Early in Tom's career he was instrumental in establishing the Bay Arenac Skill Center and served as its project manager during the construction phase. He took pride in being an educator and moved on to the Essexville-Hampton School District where he was a Guidance Counselor at Garber High School for many years and then went into school administration and became the Assistant Principal of Cramer Junior High, retiring in 1994. Tom was known for his commitment to education and shaping the minds of young people. Whether through thoughtful advice, encouragement, or simply being a listening ear as a counselor, Tom made a lasting impression on every student he met. Outside of his career, Tom had many interests and pastimes. He lived a very active life and enjoyed sailing and motorcycling, was an avid woodworker and held a private pilot's license, flying as often as he could. Tom was a bicycling enthusiast and was a member of the Tri City Cyclist Club and the OLLI Cycling Interest Group at SVSU. He had a strong faith in God and was a member of Christ Covenant Church in Midland.



On July 28, 1956 Tom was united in marriage to his true love, the former Linda K. Jacobson, and together they shared a great life and raised a wonderful family. He is survived by his wife Linda; three children, Mark (Deborah) Kennedy of Beaver Falls, PA, Susan (Gary) Katt of South Haven and Andrew Kennedy of Milford; 13 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren; a brother, Walter Kennedy of Gladwin; two sisters-in-law, Janet (William) Toporski of Bay City and Carol Jacobson of Wilmington, NC; his special friend, Jack Clark; and many nieces and nephews, Glenda (Mike) Nadeau, Cathey Kennedy, Barbara (Joe) Naugel, Nancy (John) Jerry, Matthew Jacobson and Jonathan (Kristel) Jacobson. In addition to his parents, Tom was also preceded in death by a daughter-in-law, Irene Pawley Kennedy; a brother-in-law, Douglas Jacobson; and a sister-in-law, Beatrice Kennedy.

A Memorial Service will take place at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, December 21, 2024 at Christ Covenant Church, 2821 Ashman St., Midland, MI 48640, with Pastor David Sarafolean officiating. Private interment will be at Floral Gardens Cemetery. Both stories were in the Worcester Telegram (Worcester, Massachusetts). The first was on January 27, 1916, and the second was on December 8, 1919.

STURBRIDGE, Jan. 26.—Mrs. Louis Jarvis, wife of Louis Jarvis, Fisk-hill district, sustained several large contusions to the parietal region yesterday forenoon, when she slipped on a patch of ice near her home. INJURED MAN IS FOUND BY WIFE

**Louis Jarvis, Sturbridge,
Crawls Nearly Mile
After Fall**

STURBRIDGE, Dec. 7.—Louis Jarvis, aged 65 years, a farmer, who lives on Fisk hill, Sturbridge, while out caring for a neighbors' cows yesterday morning, slipped and fell from a ladder, a distance of 20 feet to the barn floor causing him to be unconscious half an hour.

Mr. Jarvis, with the aid of one crutch and a cane was able to be about in his home. He said: "I had just finished getting some hay down from the hay-loft and had started to descend the ladder when I misjudged a ladder rung and fell, striking on my right side. For nearly a half hour, I should judge, I did not remember anything. When I did begin to realize what had happened and where I was, I knew I was nearly a mile from my home.

"I tried to get on my feet, but could not. I managed to crawl out of the barn and to the road, and was still crawling on my hands and knees in the road, and was within about one-quarter of a mile from my home when my wife overtook me on her way back from Sturbridge center, where she had been to take some school children to school.

"With the aid of my wife, I managed to get into the buggy and go home. She immediately went to the nearest telephone, a mile away, and called Dr. George W. Tulley, who came and gave me medical attention. He told me he was not certain whether the fall caused any broken bones, but if my condition is not changed soon, I may be obliged to go to a hospital for an X-ray examination, to determine whether there were any broken bones or internal injuries.

"I am certain of one thing that I will not be able to do much if any farm work on my farm during the rest of the winter months."

Following are statistics covering the period since the last issue of the Clarion, in September:


