Beginning in March 1992, the National Archives - Great Lakes Region will be open the second Saturday of each month, 8:00 AM to 4:15 PM. Appointments are strongly recommended and will follow the weekday format of two four-hour blocks: 8:00 AM - 12:00 noon and 12:15 PM - 4:15 PM. The Archives will also be open every Tuesday, except for federal holidays, until 8:30 PM, adding a third four-hour block of appointments from 4:30 PM - 8:30 PM. Appointments are advised.

As an added bonus, in conjunction with the release of the 1920 census on March 2, the Archives will be open every evening until 8:30 PM during the week of March 1 only, Monday through Friday. A third four-hour block will be implemented, 4:30 PM - 8:30 PM. Again, appointments are recommended.

ROYAL AND NOBLE GENEALOGY Anthony Hoskins Newberry Library

This is one of the most problematical areas of genealogical research. Untold numbers of invalid so-called "royal" lines have found their way into print over the years. Many of these lines were published as much as eighty to one hundred years ago and many people refuse to believe that these venerable errors can be wrong: "if it's old and in print, it must be true" is apparently a prevalent view among many unscientific genealogists. Every good genealogist should learn to quickly determine the potentially good from the potentially bad lines before seriously considering further examination.

Avoid anything by Virkus, Browning, Wurts, and Jordan as well as any other

undocumented or otherwise suspicious sources.

Use of the following works will do much to insure that one is not lured off the track of verifiable and scientific genealogical research.
