Genealogy Research and Name Changes

As Genealogists, we have all experienced the name changes we find in our research. Family name spellings often change over time due to factors like immigration, literacy levels and assimilation efforts. When people move to new countries, they might simplify or translate their surnames to better fit the local language and pronunciation or to make it easier for authorities to record them. It's crazy, but also keep in mind that the spelling of surnames was not standardized until the 20th century. In the 19th century and earlier, the vast majority of people were illiterate, so they didn't know or care how their names were supposed to be spelled. They just wrote down what they heard. Hence, the importance of phonetic spelling whenever you're looking for a surname in early records. If it sounds the same, it probably is the same.

My Neering ancestors were Flemish Belgians. There was a large concentration in the Detroit area and also in the Bay County. My family lived in Detroit before settling in Hampton Twp. The original spelling of the name was Neirynck. You can see how the pronunciation came out to sound like "Neering". There is an interesting case in the paternal (Neering) side of my family. I came across this inquiry _ on a Netscape (remember that?) genealogy website – long before Ancestry- and thought it was an interesting way to keep families straight. I found this explanation in 1999, written by Jan Nearing, explaining why there are Nearing, Neering and Nehring spellings in Bay County.

"I guess you're related to Emil, et al. There was always major confusion about the three different families with this name. Yours, in Essexville, was indeed Flemish. Mine, from Portsmouth Twp (Indiantown)...later Munger and Bay City...was German/Polish, and Catholic. A third family from Frankenlust was German...not a drop of Polish (or at least so they claimed), and Lutheran.

It drove the postmaster in Bay City nutty. Finally in the early 1910's, he laid down an edict (illegal, but he did it none-the-less). Your family would be Neering. My family, which used a few variations (Nering, Nehring, Neering) would be Nearing. Those in Frankenlust became Nehring and had to lose all of their variations. According to my uncle Steve, the threat was that if one used any other version of the spelling, the postmaster would prosecute.

Being a bit of a tease, my great uncle Pat did start using Neering, saying that no one would tell him how to spell his own name. That was the name on all of his school records and he refused to change. This caused major problems in trying to research the family tree. When my father started courting my mother, my maternal grandmother was none too happy. Seems she knew my father's dad and his family, even went to Merritt School with many of them, and being French, they always picked on her. Mom and Dad decided that since his dad was dead and there was no one to burst their bubble, they would tell my grandmother (who was part Dutch) that he was part of her Belgian family.

She never knew the truth until two years ago when I asked her about my grandpa Ed. "Ed's not your grandpa, he was a Pollack." Oops, I didn't know that she didn't know. Oh well, Mom and Dad were married for over 30 happy years. Both are gone now, and Grandma warmed to my dad through the years."



Facebook (Bay County Genealogical Society-Michigan)

Per Article IX of the Bay County Genealogical Society-Michigan Bylaws, the fiscal year of the Society runs from January 1st through December 31st, but per Article VII of the Bylaws, the Society meets from September through June. Thus, even though the Society only meets as a body ten months in a twelve-month period, the Society is in business for the full twelve months and so is Facebook and the Society's website, where people can visit to ask for help or see what is going on at the Society.

Following is Facebook and website data compiled for the twelve-month period, July 2024, through June 2025 inclusive. This period covers the two months, July and August 2024, in which there were no meetings, but the Society could still be contacted.

Facebook (Bay County Genealogical Society-Michigan)

There were forty-six postings during that period. Nineteen were queries for local information, and twenty-seven were notices of upcoming events and information that may be of interest.

Website (baymigensoc.com)

There were 638 "Site Sessions", defined as visits to the website. The day with the most sessions was December 11, 2024, which had nine visits. Visitors came from the United States (579), Canada (34), Bangladesh (9), Philippines (4), Poland (2), United Kingdom (2), China (2), Turkey (1), Switzerland (1), Pakistan (1), Romania (1). Belgium (1), and Germany (1)

The town outside of the United States with the most visits was Laval, Quebec, Canada, which is a suburb of Montreal. Laval visited the website twenty-three times and looked at forty-eight pages. No other town was close.

The state, inside the United States and not named Michigan, with the most site sessions was Kansas. It had twenty-four visits, and they all came from the same town, Overland Park, which is in Johnson County. The next city, with the most site sessions, was Chicago, Illinois. It had twenty.

Within Michigan, most visitors came from Bay City (107), Saginaw (31), Midland (30) and Detroit (26).

Eleven items from June 29, 1936, edition of the Bay City Times were added to the website in June 2025.

A New Headstone is Blessed!

Jim Verney, a BCGS member, discovered during his family history research that his great, great grandmother, Delia (born St. Aubin, an early Detroit area French family) Vernier Barlow Hovey (1835-1922) was buried in Calvary Cemetery in Kawkawlin but there was no gravestone. There is now a beautiful gravestone thanks to Jim and Karen! On May 8th her life was celebrated (she lived a long life and was widowed three times) and her new gravestone was blessed by Father Jose Maria Cabrera. A memorial gravestone was also placed and blessed for Delia's grandson, Johnny Vernier (1886-1891) who had a tragic death from fire burns.

Instructions from Justin Frost:

This was provided at the April 9th meeting.

-Suggested Cleaning Supplies

D/2 Biological solution (Cemetery Preservation supply LLC, Holland supply)

Soft Brush (nylon, Tampico, horsehair)- Hand test- if it hurts your hand its too stiff

Plastic or Wood scrapers (drywall scraper, paint stir sticks, skewers, tooth picks)

Towels/Rags

1-2 Gallon garden sprayer (dedicated for D/2)

1-2 Gallon bucket for rinse water

Plenty of water

<u>How to clean- Step By Step</u>- all you need is D/2 biological solution, water, a brush and a bucket

- 1. Wet the stone down with water
- 2. Allow water to soak in and repeat
- 3. Keep stone wet while scrubbing with soft brush (dip brush in water)
- 4. DO NOT OVERSCRUB! Remove only loose material
- 5. Detail brushes can be used to clean lettering if desired
- 6. Rinse thoroughly with clean water
- 7. Allow water to run off for 5 minutes
- 8. Apply D/2 Biological solution over entire stone and leave it
- 9. Come back in a few weeks or months and check for remaining growth
- 10. Lightly brush trouble areas and reapply $\mathrm{D}/2$ as needed
