


November 9th:

Out of the Box Ideas

What “out of the box” ideas have you used in your genealogy research? I have read several posts on Facebook in which people have done unique things in their research quests. This is mine.


A few months ago, we moved my Grandmother into an assisted living facility. After a few mishaps at home, she decided it was for the best to do this. After all, she had just celebrated her 100th birthday and felt she needed more help throughout her day than she was getting at home. After we finished moving her into her new home, we started the process of emptying out her condo. Everyone took a few mementos home and we prepared what was left for a living estate sale.

One job I took on for the family was organizing my Gramma’s recipe box and making copies of it for everyone. This had the potential of being a huge undertaking since my Gramma collected recipes from everywhere. She would bring them home from vacations she took and would write companies (this was very pre-internet) and request recipes for their product. If she ate something in a restaurant that she liked, she would ask how they made it. Let’s just say, her recipe box is bigger than a shoe box!

Anyway, after sorting the handwritten recipes from the magazine /newspaper clippings, I started to notice little notes on the cards related to the recipe: “Freddie’s Favorite” “Phil Loves this” “Went over well at family party”. One of the recipes was part of a letter my Grandma’s Mother wrote to her. It said this recipe was her famous Golden Surprise Cake and she had entered it into a contest and hoped it would win. I never knew she could cook let alone had entered cooking contests.

This led me to the idea that maybe I could learn a little bit more of my family thru these recipes. I took the box over to my Gramma and asked her to talk about where she got the recipes and what the history was behind them. Our talk lasted over two hours and covered only twenty recipes, but I got stories for each one and found a new way to research the women in my family, many of whom have very little about them in government records.


There was a recipe for Swedish Rye Bread that my Grandma absolutely loved. It belonged to my Grandfather’s Aunt who came from Sweden. Uncle Edwin and Aunt Jenny lived in Pennsylvania, and she was known for her baking.



Once she found out that my Gramma loved her bread, she always baked a loaf for her to take home after their visits. This little tidbit helped give a little insight into a woman whom I only had a few records of. Before, I only had her birth/marriage/death records and one picture. Now I can add a recipe to her bio and a note that she was a generous person who loved to bake.

I wrote down the stories in a notebook along with the names of the recipes. When I get them all sorted and ready to copy, I will include the stories so the rest of my family can enjoy learning something about the women in our family.

Now I can't wait to go back and look over more recipes with Grandma and learn a little bit more about her mother's recipe and whether or not she won her contest (the ingredients for the cake included Campbell's Tomato Soup in the cake & the frosting!).



Knead Well, grease Hands
to knead dough grease
bowl and dough, put back
in bowl and raise to double
in size.
Divide into 2 loaves. Knead
again.
Place in greased bread
tins and let raise again

Bake in slow oven about 208
or 300° for 1 hour more if it
sounds hollow when hit with
knuckles it's done.

(Use 1 water and 1 milk
And add 2 Table spoons butter)
